HEALING A WOMAN AND JAIRUS'S DAUGHTER

- 1. Read Mark 5:21-43. What does this account tell you about the healed woman and Jairus?
- 2. What is the problem with the woman touching Jesus' robe? What do the woman hope for?
- 3. When her activity is discovered, the woman approaches Jesus "in fear and trembling" (v.33). Why?
- 4. What does Jesus calling the woman "daughter" mean for her? For you?
- 5. How did Jesus especially put Jairus' faith to the test?

OPPOSITION TO THE GOSPEL

- 6. Have you ever met opposition to a witnessing moment? Describe the interaction briefly. How did you react? How did you feel?
- 7. Read Mark 6:1-6. What kind of reception did Jesus receive in His hometown, Nazareth?
- 8. What hindered Jesus from bring more blessings to His hometown? What can we learn from this negative example?
- 9. Read Mark 6:7-13. "[He] began to send them out two by two...". If you consider our discussion as to what the 12 disciples symbolized (3:14) and the emphasis of Isaiah's words in Isaiah 2:1-5 and 60:1-7, what is the significant change happening with the coming of Jesus and the reign and rule of God?

- 10. What was the purpose of the instructions given to the twelve disciples? How does the wisdom of these instructions apply to our own time?
- 11. What is the purpose of Jesus sending out the 12? The simple answer is found in vss 12-13. For the fuller answer consider Jesus' ministry in Mark 1.
- 12. Read Mark 6:14-29. How had John testified against Herod? How had Herod received John's testimony? What did Herod's foolishness lead him to do?
- 13. Why do you think John the Baptizer's faithfulness was not rewarded with more years of life on earth? What comfort remain for us as Christians?

JESUS FEEDS THE FIVE THOUSAND

- 14. Read Mark 6:30-44. Follow Mark's construction: Jesus sends out the 12, John is put to death, and now the disciples return. What message is related by the placement of John's death?
- 15. The Feeding of the Five Thousand has much more going on that simply a miraculous feeding. What is the significance of verse 34: "he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd"?
 - A. Read Numbers 27:15-18.
 - B. Read Ezekiel 34:1-16.
 - C. Read Psalm 23.
- 16. We have discussed this before, but for the sake of review, what is central to the implementation of the eschatological reign and rule of God?
- 17. Mark's Gospel repeatedly has established that Jesus is Yahweh in the flesh. How then does this story relate to Exodus 24:9-11? And Isaiah 25:6-9?
